It's disrespectful to the patients and dishonorable to the medical profession, as well as intellectually lazy."

"In training to become a physician you take countless examinations that purport to measure your worth. But your worth as a physician truly begins to be measured when you engage in patient care. The patient, you would be well served to learn and remember, is your best teacher; one you should always listen to with respect and careful consideration."

"Medicine is a profession, not a job. We physicians should do more. We never have the opportunity to learn more than when the physician treats a patient who does not fit the standard diagnostic box. Thank goodness for these opportunities because I never want to work in an environment where we color by the numbers."

"If you the Physician don't listen to the patient who is your subject matter - where the patient is the only reason you exist as a physician or as a profession - you will learn nothing as you 'practice' Medicine. You should 'practise' something else as you have numbed yourself into irrelevance; you have become void and meaningless, and you are not worthy of your title as a healer."
